Matthew 28

1 After the Sabbath, at dawn on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to look at the tomb. 2 There was a violent earthquake, for an angel of the Lord came down from heaven and, going to the tomb, rolled back the stone and sat on it. 3 His appearance was like lightning, and his clothes were white as snow. 4 The guards were so afraid of him that they shook and became like dead men. 5 The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. 6 He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. 7 Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him.' Now I have told you." 8 So the women hurried away from the tomb, afraid yet filled with joy, and ran to tell his disciples. 9 Suddenly Jesus met them. "Greetings," he said. They came to him, clasped his feet and worshiped him. 10 Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid. Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me." 11 While the women were on their way, some of the guards went into the city and reported to the chief priests everything that had happened. 12 When the chief priests had met with the elders and devised a plan, they gave the soldiers a large sum of money, 13 telling them, "You are to say, 'His disciples came during the night and stole him away while we were asleep.' 14 If this report gets to the governor, we will satisfy him and keep you out of trouble." 15 So the soldiers took the money and did as they were instructed. And this story has been widely circulated among the Jews to this very day. 16 Then the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. 17 When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. 18 Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. 19 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 20 and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

Tidbits of information from Session/Council meeting of March 19, 2019, that you may find helpful:

Opening: Joyce Hetzler, Committee on Ministry liaison, serving as our moderator opened with prayer.

Deacons' Report: Dan Groom gave a report Deacon activities, a financial report, and an updated list of homebound members.

Clerk's Report: Church membership is 132 now with the addition of Brady Groom, Asher Neville, Drew Pequignot and Paige Pequignot when they took their reaffirmation of baptismal covenant vows recently. For the record: A letter from the Building & Grounds committee that the church and manse insurances have been reviewed and that there is excellent coverage for both properties.

Bridge Pastor Committee report: Mary Longstreth gave a report on their progress.

Designated Pastor Nominating Committee: Debbie Davis reported our Church Information Form is in circulation. The committee has obtained several Pastor Information Forms which are being reviewed. Attempts to contact those interested in our position are being made.

Committee Reports:

Building & Grounds: Kevin Barnum reported that he has received a letter from the Pulse 3 Foundation regarding our application for the AED, automatic external defibrillator. The application will be reviewed in the May. The committee was asked to review the key policy and also to devise a security policy for the church. K. Loviska also asked that the "facilities policy" be reviewed as there seem to be some discrepancies in it.

Mission & Evangelism: Kitty Blehm reviewed the missions for April, including the ten families who will be receiving Easter food baskets. Blanket Sunday was a success with the donations totaling \$310.00. Kathy Loviska shared the events for Pentecost Sunday.

Personnel Committee: This committee was left in limbo when the session returned to the separation of the session and the deacons in January. Committee structure was discussed and decided upon at this time. One member from each of the session committees will be a member of this committee and the moderator will be an acting ruling elder.

Spiritual Life & Congregational Care: Mary Longstreth discussed the pulpit supply situation. The Lenten soup suppers are scheduled for March 27th with the Deacons hosting that evening. The session will host the supper on April 10th.

Women's Association: The baby shower for the Old Town Christian Outreach will be 3-19-19. Craft and Flea Market on 3-30-19 has many places reserved by crafters.

The Campfire disaster in California is one example of OGHS emergency fund use. Housing, potable water, jobs were provided.

OGHS funds are available for <u>immediate</u> use when a disaster occurs, but OGHS also provides seedlings, helps with education and development projects so relief can continue.

The CTC Women's Association held a "Baby Shower" to benefit the Baby Pantry (Old Town Mission) and the Underground Railroad. The following items were donated:

Hugging is one of the most amazing things that we could ever give another person. Hugging is essentially a form of therapy in itself.

When we receive hugs, it gives us a sense of comfort, care, love, understanding, and many other indescribable feelings. Having that said, wouldn't you agree that giving each other a hug every single day would be a good idea?

There is more to hugging than the surface appearance of it all. There is an actual science that happens within us when we are receiving a hug or giving one to someone else.

The physiological changes we experience deep within as we are

being hugged could be described as one of the ultimate forms of being human and alive.

1. Balances the Nervous System

Just by giving someone a hug, you have already begun to balance their nervous system.

Tiny egg-shaped pressure sensors referred to as Pacnician corpuscles found within the skin are linked to the brain through our Vagus nerve.

What happens when moisture and electricity hover over the skin during a hug can show a balanced state of your

nervous system parasympathetic, something that is achieved by psycho-physiological coherence that is created when you are passionately hugging someone!



2. Reduces Stress Levels

Hugging someone can ease a majority of their stress immediately and effectively. Too often we underestimate the power of hugging.

What happens is that when being hugged, the level of cortisol that is circulating throughout our body is reduced tremendously.

This means that our minds are able to calm down and think without stress. The next time you are with your significant other, give them the biggest hug you can summon!



3. Better Overall Mood



When you hug someone, you begin to increase the production of serotonin in your brain which is the essential chemical you need for a positive attitude/mood. This also boosts your self-esteem.

Something to keep in mind when thinking about depression or those who are lonely, is that they are experiencing really low levels of serotonin.

When you hug someone, the brain begins to release more serotonin and endorphin into your blood vessels, creating pleasure and expelling sorrow.

4. Relaxes Your Body

Hugging can actually cause your muscles to relax in the best ways possible. When receiving a hug, our muscles begin to release tension all over the body. Seriously, why aren't we hugging each other more often?



5. Heart Health Improves/Decreased Heart Rate

Hugging has the amazing ability to decrease our heart rate.

A study brought to light by the University of North Carolina - Chapel Hill, suggested that the volunteers who had little to no contact at all with their partners had developed a much faster heart rate of 10 beats per minute, compared to the standard 5 beats per minute of those who were hugged by their partner all the time.

Essentially, the lower your heart rate is the less trouble you will have for cardiac illnesses.

In short, we need to be hugging each other every single day for our mental and physical health. More importantly, our happiness.

PDA recovery efforts help Haitians thrive in new communities

LOUISVILLE — The 2010 earthquake that devastated Haiti and changed it forever also set Andral Estes's life on a radically different course.

Estes lost his home and career in Port-au-Prince, Haiti's capital city, and moved to a rural community on Haiti's Central Plateau. He now makes his living as a small-scale farmer, a far cry from his former occupation in the insurance industry.

He said having a good education helps him navigate his new path, and he and other earthquake survivors see education as key to Haiti's future.

In his new community, which was built with help from <u>One Great Hour of Sharing</u> (<u>http://specialofferings.pcusa.org</u>) Estes is a leader. He and his neighbors, who are also earthquake survivors, fled to the safety of the Central Plateau, which was largely unaffected by the temblor. In Port-au-Prince and the surrounding region, an estimated 300,000 people lost their lives.

Residents of the newly constructed community knew little about farming when they moved there, but Estes led them to embrace their new circumstances. He credits his education with giving him the skills needed to adapt to a profoundly different life.

"I look back at the earthquake of 2010 and think that If I hadn't gone to school, my life would be much more difficult than it is now," Estes said. Concern for their children's future led earthquake survivors living in the Central Plateau to make building a school a top priority. Haitians will never thrive without a good education, Estes stressed.

"In Haiti, if you don't have an education you are like a dead person," he said. "This is why the school we have in this village is the most important thing to us after the roof we have over our heads."

<u>Presbyterian Disaster Assistance</u> (PDA)(http://pda.pcusa.org/), supported by One Great Hour of Sharing gifts, helped Estes and his community secure livelihoods that made it possible to pay school fees for their children and buy uniforms.

With the help of Presbyterian congregations, his community constructed a school with classes through the sixth grade. The community recently added a room for the seventh grade.

"My dream is to keep expanding it to a high school and even a decent university, so our children don't have to travel to other cities for an education," he said. To attend high school now, students must walk five miles each way.

Estes and his neighbors live in an eco-village, a community designed to be socially, economically, and ecologically sustainable. Longtime Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) partner Mouvman Peyizan Papay (MPP) worked with the residents to build the community and the school.

The residents provided most of the labor for their houses and the school, and the responsibility for school expansion is solely in their hands.

To acquire building materials, community members mine sand, a raw material for blocks, from a nearby riverbank and lug it up a hill in five-gallon buckets. They wash the sand to remove silt and stones, and then it goes to a block manufacturer. In exchange, the manufacturer furnishes the community blocks for school construction.

Estes's eco-village is one of four on the Central Plateau that benefited from One Great Hour of Sharing gifts. Children from the 160 families in this eco-village are joined by students from the surrounding community at the school. "Everyone has a right to an education," Estes said. "We are not going to reserve the school for only our children."

On Thursdays, as many as 90 volunteers gather near the school to work fields that grow vegetables that feed the children. It's easy to recruit parents to work because of their commitment to education and their gratitude for the school's quality, Estes says. Its teachers are certified by the government, which also pays their salaries.

Students like sixth-grader Jessica Esten also take pride in the school and see it as critical to their future. "If we didn't have a school, I wouldn't feel good because I wouldn't know how to read and write," she said. She said she wants to "become a nurse so I can help my community."

Estes is grateful for everyone who helped make his community and the school a reality. He dreams of gathering them in one room and thanking them. "I want to tell them what they have done for us," he said.

Through One Great Hour of Sharing, Presbyterians across the United States have helped make a new life possible for Andral's family and their neighbors. Most congregations receive the offering on Palm Sunday or Easter Sunday. In addition to PDA, One Great Hour of Sharing also supports the Presbyterian Hunger Program (http://presbyterianmissions.org/ministries) and the Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People (http://presbyterianmissions.org/ministries/sdop/).

UCC grant, savvy support recovery for Pennsylvania flood survivors

Six weeks of rain caused repeated flooding last summer in Schuylkill County, Pa. Some areas had severe damage to homes, including loss of furnaces and water heaters.

A UCC Disaster Ministries grant of \$10,000 is ensuring that affected families have heat and hot water through the winter.

Funds are designated for people with few or no resources and with severe unmet needs. They are being allocated through the UCC's Pennsylvania Southeast Conference and its Schuylkill Association, which have stepped up to support the flood recovery effort.

FEMA is providing some help in the form of loans and public assistance, but no grants for repairs, said Karl Jones, Pennsylvania Southeast Conference Disaster Coordinator. "Several families are still not back in their homes. It falls to the voluntary sector to provide the resources necessary for people to recover."

"Karl has done an amazing job finding the right people to help with case, volunteer and construction management," said Zach Wolgemuth, UCC Disaster Ministries Executive. "He is helping the community cast its vision for recovery."

The UCC is working with the Schuylkill County Long-Term Recovery Coalition, formed in 2006. To date, 31 families have come into case management with the coalition.

The UCC's Schuylkill Association Disaster Fund has raised more than \$22,000 to support this effort, with other partners contributing toward the roughly \$88,000 overall budget. Other contributions have come in the form of volunteers, inkind gifts and donations, and use of space.

Pennsylvania Southeast Conference Minister the Rev. William Worley observed that one of the conference's 2020 Vision objectives was "to see five cities or towns being positively affected by the presence of a UCC congregation as measured by the quality of life standards (i.e. education, housing/homelessness, crime reduction, employment opportunities, health/wellness) of those communities.

"That objective was reached in several towns of the Schuylkill Association," Worley said. "The pastors and lay leaders of local churches there worked together in response to summertime flood damage in and around their communities. The Mayor of Tremont, Pa., Mr. Ricky Ney, presented a plaque, now in the keeping of St. Peter's UCC, Tremont, in gratitude for all that the United Church of Christ did in support of the people in Tremont, Pine Grove, Hamburg and the surrounding areas."


