OUR PASTOR

Thank you for welcoming me as your pastor! Your warmth, your openness, your stories, all have left me with a sense of being welcomed. I am looking forward to joining you in your ministry here at Countryside Trinity.

So you might know more about me, here are some facts. I am the second child, first boy, of Anne and Dick Piper, both of whom were native Pennsylvanians, who moved down to Miami, FL, my place of birth, soon after they were married. Our Hymn of the Month

Each week this month we will be singing the hymn, *God is Here!* #409, from the purple Glory to God Hymnal. This hymn recounts for us our efforts to reach out to God in worship each week in hopes of being renewed by God's Spirit and strengthened for our lives of service while its music sets the respectful and hopeful tone for our gathering as the people of God in the presence of God.

The Glory to God hymnal is fairly new to us as a congregation, having come to us as a gracious gift from the Warren Ave. members with the hope that it would enrich our worship together. Within it are most of the old favorite hymns we know by heart, as well as newer hymns that offer words and music which will empower us to connect with generations who will come after us. It is our hope that in learning these newer hymns we will offer to those who are outside of our walls presently a welcoming place where the consolation and abundant life of God can be found. The reasons behind the new Glory to God hymnal are found in its Theological Vision Statement:

It will be offered in a world in which trust in human progress has been undermined and eclectic spiritualities often fail to satisfy deep spiritual hungers. It will be used by a church many of whose members have not had life-long formation by Scripture and basic Christian doctrine, much less Reformed theology. It is meant for a church marked by growing diversity in liturgical practice....To inspire and embolden a church facing these formidable challenges, the overarching theme of the collection will be God's powerful acts of creation, redemption, and final transformation.... Though the New Century Hymnal is not new to everyone, we will also be mining this resource for Hymns of the Month for new songs for these same reasons. YOUR SESSION/COUNCIL AT WORK

Tidbits of information from Session/Council meeting of June 29, 2019, that you may find helpful:

Opening: Joyce Hetzler per request of Pastor Margaret Vedverveld, served as our moderator and opened with prayer.

Clerk's Report: Church membership is 133. Communion was served to 53 parishioners on June 2, 2019.

Pastor's report: Bridge Interim Pastor Margaret Vredeveld submitted a written report for review.

Designated Pastor Nominating Committee: The terms of call for Rev. Brant Piper were reviewed by session members. Motion sustained to establish a 403B matching plan for availability for all full time exempt employees.

Denominational report: Longstreth, attended as elder commissioner, gave a report of Presbytery meeting on June 4, 2019. Parker also attended and talked briefly on the ALICE report on poverty in Michigan.

Committee Reports:

Building & Grounds: C. Davis reported that having the parking lot seal coated would be a waste of money because the lot would require more work in a few years. For now, the lot will be stripped by Yeager for approximately \$810.00.

Evangelism & Mission: Blehm reported that the Pentecost offering will be donated to the READ program. Session approval was given to invite Teen Challenge to present their program on July 28, 2019 and to have a "Christmas in July" with gifts and/or monetary donations for them.

Personnel Committee: A "conflict of interest' policy was adopted for session members. The policy was signed by session members and will be filed in the office.

Spiritual Life: Longstreth reported that Jennifer Saperstein is a candidate for ministry and will be our guest preacher on July 14, 2019. Three high school graduates were honored on June 2, 2019. The "Spiritual Life" committee description was adopted.

New Business: Next Session meeting will be on August 20, 2019 at 6:30 PM unless we have a new minister who wants to have a meeting in July.

The Designated Pastor Nominating Committee, after the election to accept Rev. Brant Piper as our designated pastor, was dissolved at the congregational meeting on June 30, 2019. The DPNC would like to thank the family and friends of Countryside Trinity Church for their prayers, patience, and support during this search time. It has seemed like a long 2 ½ years during which time the mission study was started and completed. We moved into the transition time with supply pastors. Then Rev. David Meyers served as our interim pastor. Thirty four members of Warren Avenue Presbyterian Church joined us in December and finally, Rev. Margaret Vredeveld ministered to us as a bridge pastor.

Our Mission Study compiled and completed by the Long Range Planning Committee was named "A Future and a Hope". The scripture from which we found strength while doing our work on the mission study was the following:

Jeremiah 29:11-13

"I know the plans that I have for you," declares the Lord,

"Plans to prosper you and not to harm you,
Plans to give you hope and a future. Then you
Will call upon me and come and pray to me, and
I will listen to you.

You will seek me and find me

When you seek me with all your heart."

Yes, God gave us the tools to work with, including the devoted people who agreed to serve on the Long Range Planning Committee and the DPNC members who worked diligently and unhurriedly to ensure that they were making the right choice for pastor of Countryside Trinity Church. Throughout this entire process we had the support and assistance of two very knowledgeable and resourceful people, Dr. Rev. Dan Saperstein, Executive Presbyter of the Presbytery of Lake Huron and Joyce Hetzler, the Presbytery Committee on Ministry liaison. After much prayer, talk amongst ourselves and with several candidates, the DPNC decided on a candidate to present to the congregation.

On June 29th family and friends of the church were invited to meet Rev. Brant Piper informally at a "Meet and Greet" gathering. On June 30th, following a congregational meeting, Rev. Piper was elected to be our new minister at CTC. Praise the Lord!

After talking with Pastor Piper (who by the way is a wonderful listener) you feel as if you have talked with "an old friend". He is compassionate and understanding, frequently asks questions and has a wonderful laugh. He is ambitious and ready to present new ideas. Pastor Brant is interested in adult Christian Education and shows concern for the community. Last, but certainly not least, he writes and delivers thought provoking sermons.

Now it is up to you, the family and friends of Countryside Trinity, to work with Pastor Piper and the leaders of the church to try to fulfill God's purpose here at 4690 Weiss Street.
