

A Message from Our Pastor



20/20 Vision

As prescribed by the Constitution, every ten years a census is taken to determine the number of residents of the United States in order to apportion the 435 congressional districts. The undertaking of the census this year is especially important for the people of Saginaw and its surrounding counties, which is in an area that has been losing 2.5% of our population over the last 10 years. The state of Michigan has been losing congressional districts for the last half century and those who study these things are predicting that Michigan will probably lose one more following this consensus. If this reflects the relative numbers in the state, well, then this loss is fairly distributed across the nation. The fear for this community, however, is that this area might be undercounted because of racial and economic divides, made more complicated by the choice of this administration to use computers which have a tendency to create barriers to participation by the poor. With this situation, there is a potential to lose not only funding, but more importantly, to lose control of the funding coming our way. With the potential of our poorer communities to be undercounted, there is a potential for these communities to have less voice in the efforts of our government, local, state, and national, to have their issues addressed.

The same is true for voting in the elections this November. There is a present struggle in our courts around issues of voting registration, with hundreds of thousands of voters being removed from voter rolls. Again, there is a tendency for people in our poorer communities to participate in our elections to a lesser degree because of barriers that we are not always aware of. This too is a justice issue. As someone who believes that each person's voice needs to be heard, I believe we are called to participate in efforts which facilitate every person's opportunities to vote.

Over the next year we all have the opportunity to participate with other churches and community organizations in efforts to increase our communities' influence and power in addressing its issues. I will be working to discern where those opportunities might be available for us and how individuals can help in these efforts. Please speak to me if you are interested and pray that both our census and elections are just and empower our communities to voice and address their concerns.

Forgotten Man Ministries provides spiritual care to the men and women in jail with the help of trained volunteers. Weekly Church Services, group Bible Studies, self-improvement classes, Christian Movie Ministries and Book Cart with faith based literature are some of the activities.

YOUR SESSION/COUNCIL AT WORK

Tidbits of information from Session/Council meeting on December 17, 2019 that you may find helpful:

Opening: Pastor Brant chose Isaiah 9:2-7 for our Lectio Divina reflection time.

Clerk's report: Church membership remains at 131. Communion was served to 52 parishioners on December 8, 2019 as the church was closed because of inclement weather on December 1st.

Pastor's report: Pastor Brant gave an update on his visits to the homebound and hospital visits, plus his activities getting prepared for the Advent season. He has accepted an invitation from the Presbytery of Lake Huron to serve on the Commission for Ministry for a three-year term beginning January 2020. His vacation request for 1/24/20 through 1/31/20 was approved by personnel committee. The session members were asked several questions regarding the effectiveness and efficiency of our church governance. Elders are to answer the questions and submit them to Pastor Brant by December 29, 2019. These will be addressed during the officer training session in January.

The closing of the church during inclement weather was discussed. The Pastor will meet with the Clerk of Session, a representative from Building & Grounds, a rep from Spiritual Life, and the administrative assistant to discuss a more efficient way to make the decision to close the church. It was felt that putting it on TV was not enough and maybe posting it on Facebook, and by e-mail might have better results. **We will keep you updated on the process.**

Finance & Stewardship: Forty-nine families have pledged a total of \$95,268.00.

Eleven pledged to increase their pledges.

There were 17 new pledges, mostly from previous

Warren Avenue folks.

Eighteen pledged the same amount.

Three pledged a decreased amount.

Christian Outreach: Donations for Hidden Harvest totaled \$95.00. Two Coins a Meal donations totaled \$56.00. Eight Christmas baskets will be packed Friday, December 20, 2019, with gifts.

Nominating: Motion sustained to call a special congregational meeting for the purpose of electing officers for the next three years following worship service on December 29, 2019. All officer training will be held on January 4, 2020 at 9 AM to 12 Noon. Installation of officers will be Sunday, January 19, 2020 during the worship service and after the present session has examined the new officers.

As members of both the Presbyterian Church, USA and the United Church of Christ, we benefit from the work and the resources of not one, but two national denominations. These resources allow us to draw on the insight and creativity of a wide variety of congregations and church leaders. Each denomination charges us a fee based on our membership as an equitable and mutual way of sharing the costs of moving the church forward in the 21st century.

This year, step out in faith and be amazed

Two roads diverged in a wood, and I—I took the one less traveled by, And that has made all the difference. Robert Frost

I hadn't read this poem in years and so, when a friend recently included it in an email, it brought back memories.

It was during my Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) in Manhattan that I was introduced to the work of Robert Frost. My supervisor, realizing — as I did — that I didn't have a call to chaplaincy work, but was there to fulfill my presbytery's ordination requirement, would refer to the poetry of Frost during our weekly check-ins as I grappled with where God was leading



me. "The Road Not Taken" was his favorite poem to quote.

As if the daily grind of hospital chaplaincy weren't emotionally draining enough, I was also interviewing with churches. As the weeks went by, most of my supervisory meetings were spent talking about the churches I began courting. Halfway through my CPE training, the church search was down to two suitors. And boy, they couldn't have been more different.

The first, outside of Washington, D.C., offered great facilities, a healthy budget and a robust membership. The other, a rural church somewhere in the Northeast, was surprisingly forthcoming about its aging building, shoestring budget and graying membership. I couldn't believe when my supervisor asked which church caught my fancy.

As I continued exploring the future possibilities with these churches, I discussed the pros and cons of each with my supervisor. Frustratingly, he never once offered advice. He just listened and asked questions — endless questions that created more questions for me. I just wanted him to tell me what I should do.

As my time at the hospital came to an end, I was no closer to making a decision. One last time, I walked into my supervisor's office for my evaluation. I was prepared for the typical scorecard detailing where my strengths were and areas to work on. Instead, I was given a heartfelt affirmation of my call to parish ministry. There was also a bonus. I finally received my supervisor's answer to my question of "Where should I go?" The answer, though, wasn't what I expected.

He affirmed a ministry I didn't even recognize as a ministry, encouraging me to keep writing. No matter how busy life as a parish pastor would get, "keep on writing," he typed in bold and underlined. He then advised me to never be swayed by what popular opinion might be.

"Trust your heart, even when your heart leads you to places that do not make sense to anyone else," he wrote. He didn't have to say anything else. That rural church was tugging at my heart.

He then put the evaluation down and, as if delivering a benediction, he sent me on my way with the words of Robert Frost: "Two roads diverged in a wood, and I — I took the one less traveled by, and that has made all the difference."

I left the crowded streets of Manhattan and placed my feet on a dirt country road that was foreign to me. It led to a rural church that many had said "no" to serving. I took that road and it has made all the difference — in my faith, my ministry and my life overall.

The roads less traveled are the ones that really do enrich your life. They are the roads where you meet the most amazing people and make the most precious of friends. They are the roads with little churches often ignored that, when given a chance to shine, can be a powerful testimony of how God can create something out of nothing. They are the roads where God moments, God winks, God hugs — whatever you want to call them — are abundant.

As a new year begins, I pray that all our churches have the courage to step onto the roads of ministry not often taken. May we have the faith to dream big and not be swayed by popular opinion. May we not fear the potholes or the dead ends or the roadblocks that we will encounter. Rather, may we remember the One who calls us and never stops guiding us safely onward to a destination we never envisioned.

I took the road less traveled and it led to a life I never had imagined, that of a country pastor. I took that road and find myself now walking the same woods that inspired Frost when he lived in Vermont. And every time I see a fork in a road, I make sure to take the path I have yet to be on.

Chicago church gifts Christmas Eve offering to children's relief in Haiti

The congregation of St. Pauls United Church of Christ believes it's better to give than to receive, especially on Christmas Eve. They also believe that what they get back is immeasurable. That's why the church in the Lincoln Park neighborhood of Chicago is continuing its tradition of giving away its Christmas Eve offering.

The Rev. Matt Fitzgerald, senior pastor of St. Pauls United Church of Christ, was first inspired to make this generous gift because of something he read in a book about worship attendance.

"The author said giving away the offering from a service that welcomes many guests can help disarm people's suspicions about church, while also doing good in the world," he said. "We get hundreds of visitors and guests at our Christmas Eve



services. I like to think that these folks are surprised by (gifting) the offering each year."

This will be the seventh year the church has gifted its Christmas Eve collection. The recipient is always a charitable group or community organization that St. Pauls already supports with members' time and talents. The 2019 offering is being given to Three Angels Children's Relief in Port-au-Prince Haiti.

"Haiti has been in the midst of political turmoil for months now and food insecurity is becoming dangerous," Fitzgerald said. "This year's offering will be used to provide meals for the children and families of Three Angels."

Three Angels is a small school, orphanage and medical clinic that the church has helped support for six years. In seven trips to Haiti since 2013, St Pauls clergy and congregants have taken on plumbing projects, done maintenance work, built a playground and have nearly completed a community center. Another trip is planned for early next year. On almost every trip, nurses from the congregation have provided medical care.



"At Three Angels, Saint Pauls nurses have administered medications and done hygiene teaching for the students, health screening of the staff, taught CPR and brought the first aid supplies up to date," said Mary Brown, a Saint Pauls member and hospice nurse. "We've provided an extra set of hands for the clinic nurse. We also provide nagging about hydration to the construction crew."

In years past, the church has given the Christmas Eve offering to a number of local organizations, including the Lincoln Park Community Shelter, which provides housing and social services to people in the neighborhood. St. Pauls, Fitzgerald said, founded this agency with four other churches decades ago.

"Several of the places we've given the offering to have UCC roots," said Jeff Carlson, an associate pastor. "For three years in a row we gave the collection to UCAN, the largest provider of therapeutic services to youth in Chicago. UCAN was founded by St. Pauls 150 years ago as an orphanage for German-American children after the Civil War. Today UCAN serves over 15,000 at-risk youth across Illinois."

The first recipient of the Christmas Eve offering was A Just Harvest, founded by Good News Community Church UCC in Chicago, which fights hunger and poverty in the Rogers Park neighborhood.

"St. Pauls has a long history of supporting city organizations and global ministries both financially and non-financially," said Tom Murray, a church member who currently serves as treasurer. "Our members want Saint Pauls to give to others in the same way that we give to Saint Pauls. We use our building for mission and give away a percentage of our budget each year, so this wasn't an unusual step. We are blessed to have a congregation full of members who support the church all year long."

Through their generosity, the St. Pauls Christmas Eve offering topped \$25,000 last year, funds that could have significantly helped the church's bottom line. "We try to be prudent financially, but most years Saint Pauls



operates with a modest deficit," Fitzgerald said. "The offering could help address this, but we want to be extravagantly generous at Christmastime."

The 176-year old Lincoln Park congregation is also immersed in outreach. Founded by German immigrants, the majority of its 1,000-plus membership is white. Several years ago, church leadership, through conversations on race, pledged to become more diverse in their partnerships. Since

then, members helped resettle a refugee family of six from Syria in 2017, opened a summer camp to provide for hundreds of children new to this country and Chicago, and, earlier this fall joined a coalition of black churches in Chicago to abolish \$5.3 million in medical debt for almost 6,000 people in low income neighborhoods.

St. Pauls has also agreed to a "space-sharing covenant" with Lighthouse UCC, a primarily African-American, LGBTQ congregation. Fitzgerald said Saint Pauls will be home to Lighthouse's worship and weekly meetings for the next three years.

In February, a group from St. Pauls will head back to Haiti in service, and Fitzgerald said that he and Rev. Otis Moss III, pastor of Trinity UCC in Chicago, have been talking about partnering up the two congregations in this trip.

Gifting the people of Three Angels with their presence, along with all of the funds collected St.Pauls on Christmas Eve.

"Our Christmas Eve worship services in particular are attended by many guests and extended family members," Murray said. "We hope that when they hear we are giving away 100 percent of the collection to an organization in need, that it reflects positively on our church and inspires even more joyful giving."

As Fitzgerald said, "I hope our Christmas offering helps make room for Christ and his mercy in this crowded, violent world."
