From Your Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ.

Days like today make me think of March. It's 55 degrees, cloudy with occasional bursts of rain. OK, it's only the third week of February, but as my friends in New York would say, "It sure feels like "mud time" to me. Mud time was a familiar phrase in the northeast and a great way to describe March. It speaks to the thawing of the land, the coming of spring, and the ground moisten to the point that it looks like fields of mud. It is a hopeful time as we allow ourselves the thoughts of spring, we celebrate the first crocus bulbs, we even begin our early plantings. (In my first church I was told I had to cut short a visit to a parishioner's home because it was March 17th and she had to get her peas planted!)

"Mud time" is also a playful time. Even now I find it difficult to contain the urge to jump into puddles when I see them. And what can be more playful and sometimes disgusting as making mud pies, or mud handprints on the cement, or on your shirt, or as one of my children was inclined to do, to paint the outside of your house with mud.

There is even a place for mud in our Lenten journey. On Ash Wednesday, we repeated the familiar phrase, "You are dust and to dust you shall return." Throughout Lent, we are looking at images of clay or mud, with the recognition that we are people born of mud. Genesis 2:6,7 reads, "But streams came up from the ground and watered the earth. The LORD God took a handful of soil and made a man."

Dabbling with the mud of the rivers, out of the creative mind of God, you and I were created. Which is probably one of the reasons I have mixed feelings about Lent—for it is at one time a solemn time for reflection, a serious moment to enter into the Lenten disciplines but it is also a time of celebration for it was from mud we came, and to mud we may return, and what could be more fun!

Perhaps the poet Robert Frost understood this better than most. In his poem "Two Tramps in Mud Time" he concludes that the purpose of life may be to bring together that which we do—our avocation—with that which we feel a deep passion, a calling to—a vocation. Hopefully, in the process we will bring our deep love to the worlds need, in a prayerful, playful, thoughtful and joyful way. May God grant us a vision of that possibility for our own lives and for our life together.

Jesus Predicts His Death

YOUR SESSION/COUNCIL AT WORK

Tidbits of information from Session/Council meeting of February 20, 2018, that you may find helpful as we have made a few changes in how we do things:

Opening: Pastor Dave opened the meeting with a reflection and prayer.

Clerk's Report: Church membership remains at 97. Thank you note from Kathy Loviska for Christmas bonus was read and is posted on bulletin board. Annual statistical reports have been submitted to both Presbytery and the United Church of Christ.

Pastor Myers' Proposals: This particular Session meeting was a joint meeting with the Board of Deacons. Pastor Dave presented several proposals which will streamline the functioning of our church. The Deacons were allowed in the discussions and given voting privileges by the Session.

<u>Proposal #1.</u> Since it is difficult to find members to serve on the Board of Deacons and the Session (At the present time, members number 18 if both Boards were filled and with our declining membership the Nominating committee has had increasing difficulty finding members to fill both boards.), a motion was sustained to merge both Boards into one Board on a Consistory of Sorts basis for a period of no longer than one year with full voice and vote for all members.

<u>Proposal #2.</u> In the past we have had nine standing Session committees which is a lot for a church our size. Motion sustained to move to five standing committees, Nominating, Administration, Spiritual Life, Mission and Evangelism, and Congregational Care.

The following is a list of the committees, the committees that they will comprise, and the Session members who will serve on that particular committee.

Nominating is self-explanatory. Members are Jacob Groom, Dan Groom, and congregationat-large members who were voted onto this committee at the last annual meeting Lou Diechman, Richard Woodke, and Marcia Lacker.

Administration will include Building & Grounds, Finance & Stewardship, and Personnel. Members are Mari McKenzie, Dallas Williams, and Mary Ann Parker.

Congregational Care will oversee fellowshipping events, the prayer chain, care of those recuperating from illness or injury, and the welcoming of visitors and potential new members. Members to this committee include Barb Groom, Nancy Easlick, and Aubree Mahan.

Mission & Evangelism will oversee all external relationships of the church which would include not only the mission of the month, but also relationships with ecumenical partners and entities such as Weiss School. This committee will also include public relations, developing a social media presence and working with Spiritual Life Committee to develop off campus activities for spiritual growth. This will be our "sticky connection" between the church and the community. Members to this committee include Kathy Loviska, Kitty Blehm, and Christine Greenwood.

Spiritual Life will include Christian Education (youth group is included in this), Worship (music program is included here) and the distribution of the sacraments to the homebound members. Members are Pat Denno, Sarah Gonzalez and Mary Longstreth.

***The goal is to have at least 1-2 members/friends of the church on each committee in addition to those listed above. If you are interested in serving on one of these committees please notify Pastor Dave or one of the committee members listed. If you do not volunteer you may be asked. We are all in this together so let's work together, have some fun, and try to fulfill God's mission for Countryside Trinity.

It was also decided that these various committees would meet on the Second Sunday of the month directly following church and fellowship hour for about 45 minutes. Proposal #3. Discussion ensued regarding changing our church calendar so that our annual meeting would be held when we had a fair number of members in attendance. At the January

annual meeting we just had a quorum present. Motion sustained to present to the congregation a change in the by-law to change our church calendar from the present one (which runs January 1 to December 31) to September 1 through August 31 with the annual meeting to be held on the third Sunday in September. PLEASE NOTE - Motion sustained to call a congregational meeting to be held on Sunday, March 18, 2018 to vote on the by-law change.

Old Business: Building & Grounds: Kathy Loviska gave update regarding the WIFI in the fellowship hall. Motion sustained to approve an additional \$4.99/month to be paid to Charter Spectrum for WIFI access point for any guest that may come into the church if Charter cannot correct the problem in fellowship hall with the equipment that we have installed at this time.

Mission: Kitty Blehm reported that \$134.00 was collected for the Souper Bowl for East Side Soup Kitchen and \$220.00 for Blanket Sunday.

New Telephone and Internet Provider at CTC

<u>Internet access for Charter customers</u>: On your phone, laptop or tablet, go to settings and search for available networks. Choose **SpectrumWiFi.** You will get a screen pop-up that asks for your User Name and Password. Enter that information and sign-in. I believe you only have to do this once and each time you come into the building - you will have internet access on your mobile device. As soon as I have the sign-in information for non-Charter customers, I will let you know.

OUT OF CHAOS, HOPE. Letter from the PDA

Greetings in the Light,

This past fall, three hurricanes battered parts of the Caribbean and Gulf Coast regions. Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria brought violent winds and severe flooding, and their rapid succession left many people and relief organizations overwhelmed. Your faithful and generous support, however, allowed the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to respond with the light of hope in the midst of chaos, through the work of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA). **Thank you for your support.**

Your gifts provided emergency funding in Texas, Florida, Cuba and Puerto Rico. In the days after each storm, PDA was on the ground, assessing damage, providing expert support, partnership, consultation and coordination. Impacted congregations received urgent assistance to continue in ministry to their affected neighbors. PDA's response is widening, providing resources for long-term recovery, working with partners to set up volunteer rebuilding opportunities, supporting capacity building and providing support and training for leaders in Compassion Fatigue and Resiliency. Fatigue and hopelessness often cause a second crisis long after the winds subside and the waters recede.

Historic support from Presbyterians ensured a swift response. In Florida, decades of work in partnership and capacity building with the Florida PDA Network (FLAPDAN) meant that preparation and coordination began before Irma made landfall. Collaboration with presbyteries in Texas provides coordination of disaster response efforts. Ongoing support from Presbyterians means that long-term redevelopment is accomplished as the love of Christ is made visible in all of the affected areas.

Nowhere is the need so pronounced as in Puerto Rico. Throughout the island, the loss of homes, infrastructure and loved ones has touched almost every resident. Many months later, thousands of people still lack electricity and running water. Your support is delivering the light of hope into the darkness of the disaster. From the aid and cleanup on the island, to support for presbyteries in Florida and New England as they receive many Puerto Ricans displaced by the devastation, to long-term rebuilding and development, your gifts have made the church's response possible. Because of your support, PDA is able to support a coordinator for relief and development efforts in Puerto Rico from the Puerto Rican Presbyterian community. This important step ensures that the work done by the church will be delivered efficiently and effectively and will build capacity should future disasters strike the U.S. territory.

Does the Presbyterian Church Celebrate Lent?

The season of Lent starts with Ash Wednesday.

The season of Lent is an important one for many Protestant denominations, including Presbyterians. It is a solemn period in the liturgical calendar when worshipers pray, fast and reflect on their sins and the suffering of Jesus Christ. Presbyterians use this time to focus specifically on their baptism into the faith and what it means to them. Each congregation may observe the season in its own unique way, following the traditional church calendar.

The Lenten Season

Lent begins with the distribution of ashes on Ash Wednesday. Each worshiper is invited to come to the front of the church to receive the sign of the cross on his or her forehead. The minister may say, "You are dust and to dust you shall return," or something similar. The season lasts for 40 days -- the amount of time that Noah spent on his ark, Moses spent on Mount Sinai and Jesus spent wandering in the wilderness -- and it ends on Easter Sunday.

Maundy Thursday and Good Friday

Maundy Thursday and Good Friday commemorate the last supper and the crucifixion, respectively. Services are solemn, and appropriate passages from the Gospel are read to the congregation. Tenebrae also may be practiced during this time. Candles are extinguished after each reading to symbolize the darkness in Christ's tomb, but one candle is lit at the end to remind worshipers that there is hope and that Easter is coming.

Fasting

Although it is not a requirement of the Presbyterian Church, ministers often encourage their congregation to make some sort of personal sacrifice during the season of Lent. This may be giving up a vice or small pleasure. On its website, the Presbyterian Mission Agency writes: "Some disciples may find a more valuable spiritual exercise in taking something on during Lent — a more Christ-like attitude toward others, a humble spirit at work, or a feeling of gratitude in the midst of scarcity."

Easter

The season that begins with Ash Wednesday ends with Easter. A baptismal font is often placed at the front of the church to remind the congregation of their birth in Christ. All fasts come to an end. Joyous songs are sung and praise is given for the resurrected son of God.
