FAREWELL MESSAGE FROM PASTOR DAVE

'Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling-places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also.'

John 14:1-3

Dear Friends in Christ,

You would think that after serving 13 churches the process of saying "good-bye" would be easier. Truth is it is not. I am not sure why, but it probably has to do with a couple of things: the whole sense of unsettledness that comes with moving; the feeling that I am just getting too old for this stuff; but mostly it is the sense of wonder at how deeply the effect that people have on my own sense of faith and our common journey with God. What I have appreciated so much about all of you is your willingness to try new things, to move beyond your comfort zone, and to do so with a smile on your face and with a sense of joy in your heart. One of my favorite stories that I take with me was one in which I showed a picture of all the doves that were flying in the sanctuary on Pentecost Sunday to a friend. She looked at the picture and went, "Wow". And then I told her that I was the youngest of the fourteen or so people who hung those doves and she went, "Wow, I mean REALLY WOW!" That is the incredible thing about life here at Countryside. There has not been a moment when you haven't risen up to the challenge, when you haven't gone the extra mile in faith. It is your gift. I have been blessed in your sharing it with me.

Now comes another moment in time when God is calling all of you as a congregation, and me as well to step out into a future that is not yet known. Your Designated Pastor Nominating Committee has done the hard work of compiling the needed Ministry Information Form which will soon be used to introduce this congregation to ministers in search of a call. I urge you to pray for them daily. The Session, which is very much a blend of old and new faces, will be working together to lead you into the mission and ministry of Jesus as they determine how to do the work of (the process) of this new blended congregation. Again I urge you to pray for them. The Deacons will continue to do the caring for the congregation, but will need your assistance. In times of transitions it is can be difficult to keep track of who's here and who is not. This happens even in a smaller congregation. So if you haven't seen someone in a few weeks, let a deacon know. If you are in the hospital or recuperating at home, have someone in your family call the church office so they can let the Deacon's know.

Finally, pray for each other, and for the ministry of this church. It is the most important thing any one of you can do! Remember, that when Jesus said his good-bye to his disciple, he promised them that he would send the Holy Spirit to guide and watch over them. I believe Jesus does that for every church in transition.

As for me, as of the time of this writing, I am not sure what God has in store. But I am looking forward to the next journey. Years ago I was with a confirmation class discussing the call of Christ upon our hearts. I said to the class something to the effect that the way I see it, we all have many callings in our life. I am called to be a minister of the word and sacrament, but I am also called to be Rhonda's husband, and Matt, Josh and Ben's dad. Today I can add to it that I am called to be Thatcher and Scout's grandfather. (Papa as they call me.)



When I came to this church, Kathy asked me for a photo for the Pastor's page of the newsletter and I shared one of my favorites. This is grandson Thatcher, my son Matt, and me. Now there is another grandson's hand to hold as together we go through this journey called life. So no matter what God has in store for me vocationally, I already am in the process of answering one of God's many high callings.

Which leads me to my final word: "See you later!" Twenty years ago, when my dad was diagnosed with inoperable cancer, we had a family gathering to have our last time with dad. At one point, during the weekend, the two of us were alone and he said to me, "Don't you dare say good-bye. Just say, "See you later. It's much more hopeful and it is what Jesus promised." He was right you know. Our scripture declares that Jesus will one day take us to himself—that there will be a great and glorious reunion of all the saints of light. So we may depart from each other now but the promise is that we will see each other later. This is our good news. Yet, I also find humor in that image of a house with many rooms, or many mansions as the King James Version translates it. The humor is that so often when we think about it, we think that those who are in the room or mansion next to us will be our friends and families. But I think God has a sense of humor, and that perhaps, just perhaps, when we all get to heaven, the person in the room next to us, will be the person we held a grudge against for all these years, or someone whom we just didn't like, or someone we judged in this earthly life as somehow less than ourselves and peers. Maybe, that is what Jesus is trying to say to his disciples. Make peace with your enemies now; make peace with those whom you dislike now—because you don't know if you will be spending eternity as neighbors.

Like grandfather, like grandson. My son Matt and I have a ritual whenever we are together. As one of us is heading out the door, we hug each other, and then he says, "Love you man." And, just as I am about to step out the door he says, "Later dude." So friends, it has been a pleasure working and worshipping alongside you. It has been a joy to laugh and sing and share our faith together. Thank you. So until we meet again: "Later dudes!"

Tidbits of information from Session/Council meeting of February 19, 2019, that you may find helpful:

Opening: Pastor Dave opened the meeting with prayer and a scripture reading.

Guests: Dr. Rev. Dan Saperstein, Executive Presbyter, was seated and given voice. Dr. Dan expressed his appreciation for the Designated Pastor Nominating Committee for their work. He also commended Pastor Dave for his faithful service to CTC during his time with us. The completed Mission Information Form which is what is submitted to General Assembly when a church is in a pastor search, was reviewed and approved for submission.

Clerk's Report: Church membership is 128. Norma Patterson died on January 25, 2019. Both statistical reports for Presbytery and UCC have been submitted. Motion sustained to elect Kevin Barnum as our Disaster Preparedness contact person. (Side note/ Lake Huron Presbytery has launched a new program called "Disaster Preparedness Coordination and Communication Plan" for the purpose of having contacts throughout the regions pending any type of disaster. This plan is intended to assist those in need of help in a timely manner, if and when a disaster may occur. Each church is asked to submit the name of a person who will be the contact for that particular church.)

Committee Reports:

Spiritual Life & Congregational Care: The four young people who have been taking the confirmation class will meet with the session on Sunday, Feb. 24, 2019, at 9:30 AM for their examination.

Building & Grounds: Kevin Barnum has applied to the Pulse 3 Foundation for an AED, automatic external defibrillator. Kudos was given to Ed Halase and Mike Groom for the maintenance and upkeep of the building and grounds.

Mission & Evangelism: Kitty Blehm gave a report regarding the supported missions for February and March. Marcia Lacker reported on the Ezekiel Project and motion sustained for CTC to become a member and to pay the \$125.00 membership fee. Kathy Loviska reported on the Consumer's Power Project which is engaging the assistance of churches in reaching out to people in the community to reduce energy use in their homes by making a few strategic changes. CTC will participate in this event which was approved by Session.

Old Business: Two Coins a Meal offering will be collected by the children on the first Sunday of the month.

New Business: Motion sustained to dissolve the Long Range Planning Committee.

AN INVITATION TO A TIME OF PERSONAL RETREAT

On Saturday, March 23rd, Rev. Jim Williams will lead a retreat from 9 AM – Noon in the Memorial Lounge of the Warren Avenue Presbyterian Church building. This will be the first in a series of monthly morning retreats scheduled for 2019. Each mini-retreat will be self-contained. One need not attend the entire series.

Each retreat will focus on some form, or forms, of the spiritual discipline of prayer.

You have a treasure. It's the gift of prayer. A gift worth knowing and, above all, worth using well. In these brief retreats, we will reflect on this precious gift. I invite you to put some time aside each day to pray. Prayer is "a conversation with God." Like conversation, prayer takes different forms. It is not just a "one way" conversation, however. We will spend time listening for God as well as speaking.

It may be impossible to describe all the ways people pray. Over the next year we will practice a variety of forms. Prayer with scripture (lectio divina, collatio, e.g.), body prayer, breath prayer, meditation, guided imagery, praying with icons, etc.

We pray as we speak - with our own voice. Our unique personalities, our different gifts and experiences, give our prayer its own particular intonation. Even though we may use the same words, we each pray with our own voice. God wants to hear your voice. The reflections which are part of these retreats may help you find your own voice for conversing with God, who, not only invites you into prayer, but listens to you with infinite love. Or perhaps these reflections will simply re-visit what you have already learned.

Jesus retreated often in prayer. "Come away for awhile," and retreat from the ebb and flow of your personal life. One need not be a biblical scholar nor particularly spiritual. The only requirement is a desire to improve your conscious contact with God, as you understand God, through the practice of spiritual disciplines. May God guide your consideration of these retreat opportunities.

Pastor Jim is a trained Spiritual Director. He not only studied Personal Spiritual Direction with Oasis Ministries, but he is a graduate of the Shalem Institute of Spiritual Formation's programs on "Group Spiritual Direction and Leading Retreats," and "Clergy Life and Leadership." Jim also trained as a life coach through Coaching4Clergy.

Except for the changes in the summer, due to lack of air conditioning, each mini-retreat will begin at 9 AM and end at Noon. The following is a tentative schedule for the remainder of the year:

March 23, The Spiritual Discipline of Prayer; April 20, An Introduction to Ignation Spirituality; May 18, The Spiritual Discipline of Meditation; June 15, Going deeper into Prayer and Meditation 10 AM – 2 PM Outdoors (weather permitting); August 17 Cookout and Retreat at Williams' 11:30 AM – 3 PM; September 21, More Praying with Scripture; October 19, An Introduction to Praying with Icons; November 23, The Spiritual Discipline of Simplicity; December 14, An Advent Retreat, Waiting for God.
