PASTOR'S CORNER

Abundance Conversion

As part of a spiritual retreat I was challenged to spend 2 hours writing down all of the things for which I am grateful. I admit, at first the tasked seemed to be daunting, and to keep myself from being distracted, I made sure that I would be alone at a writing desk with a pad and plenty of pencils. At first the writing seemed a little perfunctory. I thanked God for all of the usual things, my wife, my kids, my parents, my siblings, aunt,, uncles, cousins. Then I thanked God for the situations I had gone through in my life, mostly the good ones, and for the work I had that presented me with opportunities to serve people in ways that I found both energizing and challenging. And in the process, I had this experience, almost mystical, in which I found my heart beginning to overflow with a deep sense of gratefulness, even to the point of tears. I found myself filled with gratitude for those professors in my life who taught me skills and gave me knowledge that deepened my sense of purpose and meaning. I spent a page celebrating the care I had received from my youth pastor and my church, though these things had happened many years ago. And then I found myself being thankful for the setbacks and failures I had endured as I thought of the lessons I had learned from them and how they helped me gain a deeper understanding of who I am and who I could be. The pages filled up one after another as the thanks flowed onto the page.

I thought of this experience as I sat in the presbytery meeting and talked about an abundance conversion. As a presbytery we are reading the book, "Neighborhood Church; Transforming Your Congregation into a Powerhouse for Mission," by Krin Van Tatenhove and Rob Mueller. In its first chapter it speaks about a conversion to abundance as the first step in experiencing God's presence and power in the world, a conversion it describes in this way: "A conversion from scarcity to plenty must begin in the hearts and minds of each member. Rooted in the soil of gratitude for our faith and calling, it grows into new hope and vision."

As we move into our Stewardship season, we are presented with the opportunity to dig deep into the soil of gratitude and to discover again and again and again that giving is at the very heart of God. God gives us life and gives us the bounty of God's creation that we might experience the blessings of an abundant life. To offer up our praise and thanksgiving to God as well as to live our lives in obedience is the proper response for those who are able to grasp the gift. Stewardship season reminds us that gratitude "demands disciplined attention, a daily recounting of the many blessings our Creator showers on us." This recounting comes through our prayers, through our study, through our time and talents given in service, and through the financial resources we give to empower Christ's ministry in the world.

Over the next month as we explore the generous heart of God, I would invite you to enter into this daily recounting of the blessings showered on you, that you might become ever more aware of the ways that God cares for you and enjoy the blessings of a thankful heart.

Homebound Communions on Sunday, October 6th.

Following our celebration of World Communion Sunday on Sunday, October 6th, the deacons will be sending out 5 Communion Teams to our homebound members and friends in order to "extend the table" to those who are unable to join us in our community's worship. These teams are made up of two people who have been ordained as either deacons or elders and "have been instructed...in the theological and pastoral foundations of this ministry and in the liturgical resources for it." (W-3.3616e) *The intent of this provision is twofold. It strengthens the pastoral care of the church to its elderly, disabled, and homebound members by making it more feasible for them to participate regularly and frequently in the Lord's Supper. This provision also makes our celebration of the Lord's Supper a strong sign of the unity of the church by regularly including in the church's communion those who are unable to gather with the worshiping congregation. Around the communion table on this Sunday, you will notice the baskets that we use to "extend the table" to serve as a reminder of this ministry. Building & Grounds: Chuck reported that his committee is working on a priority list. At the top of the list is finding a new custodian as M. Groom resigned. We thank Mike for his service to the church as he took good care of getting things cleaned and looking spiffy.

Finance & Stewardship: Pastor Brant gave a brief report on the stewardship campaign this year. Action was taken to adopt the narrative budget as prepared by M. McKenzie and the theme of "Faith Raising" for the campaign.

Christian Outreach: K. Blehm reported that \$92.00 was collected for the 2 Coin Meal Offering on 9-8-19. School supplies have been delivered to Weiss School. Food for the Thanksgiving baskets will be collected from now until November.

Personnel Committee: The new organist, Andrew Glynn, started on September 15, 2019.

Spiritual Life: The three studies that Pastor Brant presented to the committee were approved.

New Business: K. Loviska gave brief report on the fall bazaar. Motion sustained to host a spring bazaar on Saturday, March 21, 2020.

Our own Pastor Brant Piper was one of the walkers who participated in the 2019 Annual Labor Day Walk across the Mackinac Bridge. He described it as both fun and frustrating. They parked in Mackinaw City and took a ferry to the St. Ignace side of the bridge. His group did not get to the half-way point by the deadline so they were forced to turn around and return to St. Ignance. After some concern, they did make the last ferry and were able to get back to their vehicle.

ST. IGNACE – Light rain let up as thousands of people started the 62nd Labor Day walk across the Mackinac Bridge.

Gov. Gretchen Whitmer joined those walkers crossing the nearly 5-mile long bridge that links Michigan's upper and lower peninsulas and crosses the Straits of Mackinac, which connects lakes Huron and Michigan.

Many people waiting in the predawn darkness wore ponchos in rainfall that gave way to some sunshine as the walk started at 7 a.m. Monday.

Local organizers expected 20,000 to 30,000 people to make the trek between Mackinaw City and St. Ignace.

Here is more information about the history of this exciting event.

Celebrating the 50th anniversary of the national CROP Hunger Walk movement, CROP Hunger Walks continue to raise millions of dollars each year to help end hunger and poverty through long-term sustainable approaches to significantly reduce or eliminate hunger. In each CROP Hunger "Walk community, 25% of money raised comes back to local agencies. Across the country, over 1600 local agencies receive funds from CROP Hunger Walks.

This year some 800 communities nationwide are joining together in interfaith CROP Hunger Walks around the theme "Stepping up to End Hunger Since 1969." The CROP Hunger Walk was started in 1969 by a group of energized young people in Bismarck, North Dakota who wanted to mobilize their community to fight global hunger. Today, the CROP Hunger Walk is a national movement raising funds for the global hunger-fighting work of Church World Service and local hunger-fighting agencies. Last year, over 800 events raised over \$8 million dollars.
