

Your Session Council At Work!

Tidbits of information from Session/Council meeting of August 21, 2018, that you may find helpful:

Opening: Pastor Dave opened the meeting with prayer and a short devotional.

Administrative Commission of Warren Avenue Presbyterian Church were welcomed and each person introduced themselves. Following a discussion period, a motion was sustained to commit to the blending of the congregations of Countryside and Warren Avenue. Commission members were excused and on their way to meet with the session of Warren Avenue for the same discussion.

Clerk's Report: Church membership remains at 96. Matter of record: 1. a letter from Building & Grounds Committee stating that the insurance on the manse and the church provide adequate coverage for both properties was read. 2. a letter from Lou Diechman was read stating that he had reviewed the 2017 financial records and that all was in order. Communion was served to nine homebound people in July.

Pastor Myers Report: Pastor Dave asked to have one week of "floating vacation" including one Sunday. The dates will be determined by the arrival his new grandson. Motion sustained to send a honorium to the Linden Praise Band in the amount of \$125.00 for their participation in our worship service in July.

Committee Reports:

Administrative Committee: Motion sustained to approve the budget for 2018-2018. Parking Lot repair was discussed and an appeal for contributions from the members will continue until the end of September. The goal is to raise about \$2700.00 for an asphalt company to make the repair which will last longer than if we patch it ourselves, but the type of repair on the money collected. Facilitates use and rental fees were discussed by the committee and it was decided that all remain as it is at this time. New contracts for those who use the facility on a regular basis will be renewed annually. It was decided that some of our meetings will be held in the manse from time to time per the best option presented by the insurance carrier because of the manse being vacant at this time. A check list for closing the church will be posted in the fellowship hall for anyone who is closing up the church. They can review the list quickly and double check before leaving the church.

Spiritual Life: It was suggested that the usher list of duties be reviewed and have a check list of duties available in the sanctuary for ushers to check before leaving that area on Sunday morning. **Motion sustained to increase the price of the devotional** "These Days" to \$1.00 as the church pays \$1.75 for each copy. The remainder of the leftover current copies will be donated to a correctional facility for use by the inmates. Genesis Sunday will be September 9th. The advent programs will be entitled "Finding Grace in the Nutcracker" with the possibility of attending the Nutcracker ballet in Midland in December.

Mission & Evangelism: The missions of the summer months were reviewed. Two hundred twenty-five dollars was donated and sent to Emmaus House plus all of the items under the Christmas tree in July. Items are now being collected for the children at Weiss Elementary School.

New Business: Motion sustained to have a trunk sale on September 15th with a rain date of September 22nd. Indoor and outdoor spaces will be available. The money raised will go to the Women's Association. Motion sustained to allow Pastor Dave to plan an outing in Frankenmuth to go zip lining on the Sunday afternoon of September 30th. It will be open to all members who will pay their own way






California Church untouched by wildfire that took members' homes

A UCC congregation in Redding, Calif., is planning a community meal on Tuesday, August 7, for friends and neighbors who have lost their homes and possessions to the wildfires burning in the area. While flames came within a mile of Pilgrim Congregational United Church of Christ, the church building, designed by famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright, was spared. The church family was not.

Elizabeth Cifu Shuster, who manages the office and the facilities at Pilgrim Congregational Church, said four members of the congregation have lost their homes entirely, and many are still under mandatory evacuation.

"The church was under mandatory evacuation for a time, and our congregation really stepped up to take



Pilgrim Congregational is between pastors right now, so everyone is pitching in to share information and to provide care for others in their community.

Elizabeth and her husband Tyler, who also works for the church, started a congregation-wide email thread to get everyone in on the same conversation. "In this way, we were able to learn about most of the people who lost their homes," Elizabeth said. "I cannot guarantee that there are only four at this time, because many people are still evacuated and out of town, so they don't know the status of their home yet. It's too soon to give a final number."

The blaze that ravaged Redding and the surrounding area, the Carr Fire, is one of the largest of more than a dozen fires_raging across Northern California. Six people, including two firefighters, have died. The fire has destroyed 112,888 acres in the past week, along with 1,060 homes and nearly 500 other buildings, including barns and warehouses, making it the sixth most destructive wildfire in California history, according to state fire officials. It was just 30% contained as of Wednesday morning.

On Thursday, August 2, representatives of Northern California Nevada Conference and UCC Disaster Ministries went to meet with the Cifu Shusters, to take them supplies to help start the cleanup process.

"It was deeply moving to join Associate Conference Minister Davena Jones and Revs. Bob Shore-Goss and Joe Shore-Goss in delivering 10 disaster clean-up buckets the Northern California-Nevada Conference made last month at our Annual Gathering to Pilgrim Congregational UCC," said Amanda Sheldon, program associate, UCC Disaster and Refugee Ministries. "When we made these buckets at annual gathering, we decided we wanted to keep them in our conference for when the next disaster came, but we had no idea that would be only one and a half months later!"

"As I drove from Fairfield to Redding, I watched the sky change from a clear blue, to a foggy, smoky, haze. I saw once grassy areas now charred for miles," Jones said. "Once I arrived to Pilgrim Congregational Church I immediately noticed the ash on the ground, the steps, in the plants. The air was so bad that a mask should have been worn, especially for someone like me who has asthma. So I can't help but feel a deep concern for those with respiratory problems."

"I know for a fact that the Pilgrim family is very grateful for your love, prayers, calls and support thus far," she continued. "As they discern in the next couple of weeks the type of support they will need moving forward please contact me, Pastor Davena Jones, Associate Conference Minister with your questions and ways to support this Congregation and Community. Pilgrim is currently in transition and without a pastor, so for now, our Conference office will be their Pastor and contact."

Jones said Pilgrim Congregational Church is the only church in the Conference with members who have reported loss of their homes. There were, however, other UCC congregations and affiliates threatened by the fire. Two other UCC churches and three Retirement Housing Foundation (RHF) facilities are in the Redding fire area.

"Alturas-Federated Community UCC (in Alturas) and Cedarville-Surprise Valley Community UCC (in Cedarville) are taking in a lot of smoke," Jones said. "Pastor Ben Zandstra has encouraged members of the churches (he is Pastor to both congregations) to pack important items, medications, and photos case a fire starts. Pastor Ben stated that the air is really bad, causing issues for those with respiratory problems."

Two of the RHF homes were evacuated for a few days because of approaching flames, but as of last week, the residents of RHF Housing: Butte Home and Cottonwood Home are back in community, safe and accounted for. The people of Redding Pilgrim House still have bags packed in case they need to evacuate quickly, though the fires are not currently posing an immediate threat to that community.

But the fire season in California is just beginning. And UCC Disaster Ministries is standing by to assist churches through gifts to the Emergency USA Fund. Disaster Ministries has already provided a solidarity grant, partnering with the Conference to fund Pilgrim Congregational Church's community dinner August 7.

On Sunday, August 5, Northern California-Nevada Conference Minister the Rev. Diane Weible joined Pilgrim members in worship. She said their former Pastor, the Rev. Ann Lougee, came back to preach for them. "She did a wonderful healing circle for the four families that lost their homes and for the families that were evacuated," she said.

"This fire took so many people's homes," Elizabeth said. "It also took from us six lives, most of a national park, a gem of a river trail, countless hiking trails, housing opportunities, and friends who are deciding not to rebuild and are leaving the area. We had a budding tourist economy here, and at least for the foreseeable future, that has been brought to a halt. It's impossible to name all of the loss we have encountered as a community. We will be grieving for some time."

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance prepares to send national response team to Texas

Team to assess damage from Hurricane Harvey and catastrophic flooding

LOUISVILLE – Hurricane Harvey may have been downgraded, but the torrential rains are still pounding parts of Texas. Historic flooding has forced rivers and streams from their banks, submerged homes, churches, businesses and roads, stranding thousands of people.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is maintaining constant contact with Mission Presbytery and the Presbytery of the New Covenant.

"We know that in Mission Presbytery, the major impact of the storm has taken place," said Jim Kirk, PDA's associate for national disaster response. "Presbytery leaders are doing an assessment and addressing immediate response needs. But the latest forecast calls for torrential rains to continue for the next 48 hours so it's still an ongoing, dynamic event."

Mission Presbytery includes the cities of Austin, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Rockport and more. Harvey's landfall was near Rockport and authorities say wind damage was devastating.

"A large chunk of the presbytery was impacted one way or another," said Alan Ford, who oversees the presbytery's disaster recovery efforts. "We're still trying to get information on the impact of the storms and flooding because it varies from the coastline to inland communities"

Ford says it's the worst flooding to hit the area in nearly 50 years.

"One of the problems is access to many of the flooded areas and a lot of the people have been evacuated. They don't know what they will be going back to," he said. "From what I've heard, many of the churches have been devastated by the storms and water."

Members of PDA's National Response Team, will be in the area on Wednesday to begin the review process.

"The team will connect with presbytery leadership to offer support, lend their efforts to assessing the damage and offer a ministry of presence to congregations as well as assist the presbytery in developing a short term response plan," said Kirk. "They will also connect with interfaith partners on the ground."

By the end of the week, forecasters say the Texas coastal areas could see as much as 50 inches of rain, the average yearly rainfall total for the area. The upper Texas coast and parts of southwestern Louisiana could see up to 25 additional inches according to the National Hurricane Center.

"There could be a lot of damage further inland as flooding proceeds downriver. The amount of rain we've seen inland has just been enormous," said Ford. "However bad it has been for us, it's bad or worse in the Presbytery of the New Covenant and we want to keep those folks in our prayers as well."

The Presbytery of the New Covenant includes Houston, Galveston and Bay City among others. Thousands of people have been evacuated and thousands more are still awaiting rescue according to the Red Cross as torrential rainfall from Harvey continues to deluge the area and bring additional threat to Louisiana as well.

"Just like with Hurricanes Katrina, Sandy and Matthew, we are relying on the generosity of Presbyterians to provide financial and hands-on support to help the whole church stand with these communities and the Presbyterian families," said the Rev. Dr. Laurie Kraus, PDA director. "This is a catastrophic event of wind and water, the likes of which Texas has not seen. In the Song of Solomon, Scripture says 'Many waters cannot quench love, neither can floods drown it,' and we will be there with them. Our love and partnership will be with the people of Texas for the long run."

Kraus estimates PDA will be making a three-to-five-year commitment to help communities recover from the disaster.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is the emergency response and refugee program of the denomination, committed to the long-term journey of recovery of communities adversely affected by a crisis or catastrophic event. It is funded by One Great Hour of Sharing and raises designated funds for responding to specific disasters.
