Building & Grounds: Scovill reported that 2 out-of-order commodes will be repaired. Motion sustained to allow the Boy Scouts of America to use church facilities for their District meeting on second Thursday of month from 7-9 PM, starting in December. Discussion continued regarding the moving of the pastor's office and the administrative assistant's office to area adjacent to fellowship hall.

Christian Outreach: Blehm reported that the September mission is City Rescue Mission. Motion sustained to contribute \$1000.00 to Rescue Mission for the house for foster children who have aged out of foster care and \$1000. 00 to Sherwood School to start their backpack program. This money is from the \$2000.00 Courage Grant awarded to CTC from the UCC. Motion sustained to send letter written by pastor to inactive members.

Personnel: Parker distributed staff performance review documents to various committee moderators. Ten people have signed up for the CPR classes. Date and time to be determined.

Spiritual Life: As a matter of record, the electronic vote of Session members to remove the mask mandate for those visiting the church during the week and for worship services on September 11, 2022, was sustained. Masking and social distancing will now be optional. Motion sustained to place hymnals, prayer cards, and envelopes back into the pews by October 2, 2022
